I met **Elsa Bouman** (above, with her framed collages at the now-closed Shorelake Arts), along with Priscilla Moore, Kim McIver, and Susie Arnold, when we took class after class with Larry Calkins at the Kirkland Art Center. Elsa has a radiance and humor that is unmatched, and when we would be given an assignment to make 3 works, she'd make 10. She's prolific, experimental, and thrives in any media, whether it's tackling left-handed drawing, sweeping paper and cloth through flint soup (a bucket of rainwater and rusted metals in her yard....did I remember that right?), combining cyanotype with scherenschnitte,

and she can produce works in series like nobody else.

Elsa worked as a graphic designer in the music industry (look at these <u>amazing</u> <u>concert posters</u>) and taught folk art in the Bay Area for 30 years, which

involved fiber and mixed media as well as training teachers. She has lived and made art in Lake Forest Park, WA for the last 18 years.







<u>Collage-O-Rama</u> will take place in Seattle May 9 - June 7 at <u>Slip Gallery</u>. While the walls will showcase what collage can do or be, the doors will be open for drop-in collaging and community projects!


World Collage Day, Saturday May 10, 10am - 4pm, with Danielle Krysa aka The Jealous Curator. We'll start with a talk from Danielle about finding your own creative voice, then follow it up with a collage activity where we start with the same source material. The talk will be recorded and hopefully livestreamed with the help of Northwest Collage Society. The source page file will be made available to folks in advance for satellite meetups and participation at home. (Also, a little secret, Danielle is putting on a workshop on Mother's Day Sunday called Girl Crush—register here).

Epic Add-and-Pass Closing event on Saturday, June 7. Imagine tables snaked end-to-end through a large gallery space, every chair occupied. Everyone will start a collage and then pass it to the person next to them, and we'll keep adding and passing until every person has contributed to every collage. Big thanks to Sherri Koehler and the Mixed-Media Collage Art Guild for co-hosting.

Here are some calls related to Collage-O-Rama that you might be interested in:

Artist Residency, May 12-22. This is a largely self-directed residency lead by

Cheryl from Sharp Hands Gallery. Participants will have private use of the gallery as workspace on weekdays with the weekends open to the public. Application deadline is Feb 17. See next page for an overview, and <u>click here for info and link to apply</u>.

Mission 22: Monochrome. The point of this call is to fill the walls with an explosion of color. We want people to gasp with delight when they walk in the door. Collages are due by mail by March 3. There are no entry fees and it is open to anyone. <u>Full details</u> here.

Mission 24: Complex Pictures. This is for an exhibition of digital collage, curated by Liz Ruest and Andrea Lewicki, which will be shown on a dedicated screen. RESIDENCIES

Storytelling through locative collage, assemblage, paste ups or intersection of mediums

& an exploration of documentation May 12 -22, 2025.



NWCS member **Cheryl Chudyk** will facilitate a 10 day artist residency at Slip Gallery in Belltown during Collage-O-Rama. Artists will develop a story through locative collage processes, using found or created objects to produce a visual narrative. Participants will explore methods of producing their narrative as well as dissemination.

The traditional success of an artwork is its display in a gallery, perhaps the penultimate step before it is purchased and hidden away in a collection. So many art forms celebrate a physical, finished product. Given such an expectation, a collage artist using found and discarded objects often attempts to imbue archival quality to these ephemeral elements. In the fields like photography and comics, publication is the be-all-end-all of the artwork's life. Collage artists following this track may not release originals of their work, keeping

the specific quirks of their materials to themselves.

In this residency, the focus on physicality is temporary, a means to another end. The gallery space is occupied by the artist and their process, rather than the detached conclusion of their efforts.

Do you have a social cause you'd like to champion and raise awareness for? Is there an intersection between art forms

you'd like to immerse yourself in? Is collage an intermediary step, or is the locative piece hand-painted or hand drawn, a small paste up comic, or a solid object you can hold firmly in your hand or wrap your arms around, a textile? Could it be interactive?

You will explore creating narratives, with or without actual dialogue, through the documentary process of your choice (photography, stop-motion animation, videography, etc). Your point-of-view may be yours, the materials used, that of passersby, or all of the above. A portion of the time will include discussion of how to disseminate your narrative(s), whether at the street corner scale or across multiple cities.

Congratulations to NWCS member **Katie Blake** whose collage *planted* is in the 14th issue of Cut Me Up Magazine. It uses a parts of an image from another NWCS member, **Torea Frey**, whose work was the cover art for issue 13. Included below are selections from the previous issues so you can appreciate the evolution of the imagery.

Cut Me Up Issue 14: Mixed Messages, curated by <u>Aaron Beebe</u>, is a selection of 18 artworks that combine images and text to explore the intersections of language, perception, and the inherent gaps in understanding that often arise in communication. It is available to order online.





Art at the Cave, in collaboration with the Pacific Northwest Collage Collective, presents this group show of collage artists exploring the relationship of artists to the past and the power of collage to imagine a future together.

What is your relationship to the past? Collage artists use the past to invent the present as a way of imagining the future. Some collage artists embrace the past with camp, humor and affection. Some take only fragments of the past and reject the rest. For a collage artist, every piece of work represents hundreds of creative decisions about what to include. Often, what is left out is as important as what remains.

The word nostalgia comes from the Greek words nostos (return) and algos (pain). The Swiss physician Johannes Holger believed nostalgia was a cerebral disease caused by the vibration of animal spirits in the brain. Nostalgia, like collage, allows us to time travel and manipulate our personal and cultural histories. Collage is a sort of paper witchcraft where we may invent a bold and radical future out of a pile of scraps.

Collage has been an integral part of political movements during times of artistic rebellion and cultural renewal. From Dada and surrealism to punk and street art, we celebrate the potential of collage as an accessible and democratic medium. We invite you to experiment with form and take creative risks. We invite you to explode your understanding of what collage is and take your practice in a new direction. What if collage could save the world? What if collage could save your life? Why not believe that it can?


