Summer/Fall 2025 NW Collage Society Round Robin Project

Our membership has embraced the many NWCS activities over the past few years. We have received an abundance of requests to continue with another activity. Several years ago we did a round robin activity and it is time to do it again. From July through December 2025 we are offering yet another fun project for members to try. If you have done a round robin previously you know how rewarding this project is. For those who have never done one you will find it very exciting.

In case you are unsure of what a round robin is, every participant exchanges their journal. When the journal is complete it is returned to the maker of the journal. It is fun and quite exciting to receive a journal to work in each month. Not only do you get to see other members' original work but you get to create in their journals, too.

Here is how it works.....

1. You will need to complete a six spread journal (4 x 6 inches approximately) with a cover during June. By July you will send your journal onto the next person on your list. I will provide the list to you by June 30. Each month you will complete a spread in another member's journal and then send it on to the person on your list. Your commitment is to create a journal and six collages from July through December 2025.

2. The only cost to you is postage and the materials needed to make a journal plus the envelopes to mail the journals each month. You will also receive specific directions on how to make your journal. It is an easy pamphlet stitched small book. You will receive links on how to proceed with the easy sewing. All you will need is watercolor paper; thin cardboard (like cereal box cardboard) or 140 pound watercolor paper; and some sort of string, binding thread, or embroidery thread. Easy peasy!

3. See this short video (click for <u>YouTube Link</u>) on a round robin journal that John received back from a group that he participated in a few years ago. This is a good example of what your group will be creating except our journals will have collaged work.

4. If you wish to participate please let John Arbuckle know by **June 20, 2025** His email address is johnner55@yahoo.com Right after June 15 participants will receive directions on how to create your journals. You can start making your journal and start your first spread. I hope you decide to participate. It is a fun activity where you end up with six original pieces of art in a journal. Email any questions you have to John as well.

NWCS member **Kirk Read**, <u>@anotherkirkread</u>, has a solo show in Portland. For "You Should Have Gotten Here Sooner," the collage artist and writer presents 30 recent analog collages that explore the twin heads of urban nostalgia: perpetual disintegration and resuscitation. The central series uses telephone pole scraps and won a Bronze award from Contemporary Collage Magazine. The work is a meditation on moving to Portland during the pandemic from San Francisco, where he worked as a street and shelter nurse. Other works on view use vintage schematic and children's books to assemble dreamlike southern gothic narratives. Read is the author of the memoir *How I Learned to Snap* and co-leads the Pacific Northwest Collage Collective.

After Omelas: Collages by NWCS member Clive Knights

In response to the profound short story by Ursula K Le Guin titled 'The Ones Who Walk Away From Omelas', Clive Knights created 61 original interpretive collages, a selection of which accompanied a new fine press, handmade limited edition of the story, recently published by No Reply Press. Here, all 61 collages are presented in full color alongside an introductory text and a long form essay on the cultural significance of collage authored by Clive. I thought I would feature this older publication from New Mexico based artist Zach Collins, one of my inspirations for creating "halvzies" - a term NWCS member Elsa Bouman coined after I'd returned from the first Kolaj Fest having met both Zach Collins and Allan Bealy who had each done a number of collaborative collages with different folks.—Cheryl

"<u>We Said Hello and Shook Hands</u>" is not only about the art of collage but about the art of collage collaboration. Using the Internet as his primary vehicle of communication, Collins "said hello" to hundreds of artists around the world between 2011 and 2014 by sending them starter collages (and, later, finishing collages that others had started). The result, documented in this book, is a fresh and vital body of work that consists of over 500 artworks by Collins with over 100 collaborating artists.



While the pieces reflect the individual dynamic of the personalities involved, that's just the beginning -in the merging of styles and imperatives that happens during artistic collaboration among diverse individuals, exploration and experiment run unfettered and the whole that emerges is often greater than the sum of the parts. To push the boundaries of the collaborations, Collins made sure to include both cut-and-paste collagists and digital artists, sometimes sending out the same start to both types of artists, which resulted in surprising and intriguing interpretations. Artmaking on this scale does not happen without much passion and excitement, and Collins captures the feel of the interpersonal communications by documenting internet conversations that would otherwise have become ephemeral, preserving for posterity the human spirit that fueled this important and innovative project.

Mission 23 for SACC? SQUINT + SWATCH = SQUATCH, where participants got this prompt on a postcard to fuel the challenge: "Choose an environment. This can be outside, a room, random, meaningful, your choice. Look carefully. Now squint. Reduce your vision to one color. On the other side of this card, record the color using collage." Mailed back and mounted by color, it's a testament to the powerful overlap of writing and art that drives so many makers, creators, and collage artists!

Hope is an NWCS member, and they've sustained the Keep Writing Project since 2008. Each month, subscribers get a 2-part

postcard with art and a prompt that can be detached and mailed back. Liked it? Check out more on their social media or website. Who doesn't love a regular creative nudge and powerful moment for reflection AND connection?

The Arts of Kenmore is pleased to offer the 2025 Kenmore Art Show. The 2025 theme is Joy. We are excited to bring artists and the community together to enjoy Photography, 2D, and 3D Artwork at Kenmore City Hall. August 15-17 & 22-24, 2025. Kenmore City Hall is located at 18120 68th AVE NE, Kenmore, WA 98028. Awards Each category will have 1st (\$200), 2nd (\$150) and 3rd (\$100) prizes. There will also be a Best in Show (\$300), People's Choice (\$200) and Mayor's Purchase Award. Kenmore Art Show (KAS) will feature three categories this year. 2D Artwork will include paintings, drawings, collages, scratch boards, prints, mixed media, etc. Giclee prints are not accepted. Gallery-wrap canvas must have edges finished (painted) and dry. Photography may be black & white, monochrome or color. The image must be made by the entrant on photographic emulsion or captured digitally. All elements must be original and may not incorporate elements produced by anyone else. The photograph must represent a single image. Digital applications may be applied but not to the extent that the original appearance is drastically altered. Please identify the image source (film or digital). 3D Artwork may be created in any medium; metal, ceramic, glass, wood, paper, mixed, etc. The minimum size is 6" X 6" X 6". The maximum dimensions are 30" X 30" X 30". If entries exceed 50 pounds, the artist must place, remove and provide proper pedestals. Any applied paint must be fully dry.

Postales desde el Limbo is a yearly art exhibition that brings together more than 800 established and emerging artists for charity, adapting a New York project to the city of Zaragoza in Spain.

All artists create work on 13×18 cm postcards that are provided, signing the work on the back. In this way, the buyer does not know whose work he is buying until he has paid for it, being influenced only by the sensations it transmits and not by its author.

The profits of the exhibition are donated in full to Centro de solidaridad de Zaragoza – Proyecto Hombre. This organization has been running for almost 40 years helping people dealing with addiction.
